

## THE STANDERLINE FAMILY

### First Generation of my Research

ALL DATES OF CHILDREN ARE BAPTISMS AS PARISH RECORDS DO NOT  
PUT DATES OF BIRTHS

My research with the Standerline family so far has taken me back to about 1750 to Thomas Standerline and Hannah unfortunately I cannot find either the birth of Thomas, who according to his age at Death would have been born about 1725, or any details of his marriage to Hannah so do not know her surname. Another question we ask is was Thomas really a Standerline or was he baptised as Standrin/Standring/Standaling or some other variant. On the Morman web site there are only three or four more Standerlines down in Lincolnshire for this early period and these are in the Sleaford district so where did our Thomas come from? \*\*Was he born as Thomas Standrin at Bottesford which seems the most likely person I have found. It is possible that if this is our Thomas then his parents may have come from the Isle of Axholme, as there were a lot of Standrin's and other variants of that name on the Isle. What I do know about Thomas and Hannah is that Thomas was buried on the 24 July 1814 at Hibaldstow and was age 89, and Hannah was buried at Messingham on the 15 September 1800. Unfortunately the parish register did not say how old she was. They lived at Messingham and had 6 children.

They were:-

1. THOMAS baptized 7 October 1753,
2. HANNAH baptized 30 September 1764, she married John Storr on the 9 December 1788.
3. MARY baptized 19 September 1767 and died 7 October 1769,
4. MARY baptized 20 May 1771, she married John Richardson about 1792 at Kirton in Lindsey
5. ROBERT baptized 9 December 1773. On the 26 March 1799 he married Hannah Smith at Hibaldstow. The couple lived at Hibaldstow all their married life. Robert died on the 17 April 1858 at the age of 85. Hannah died in December 1867 and was buried on the 2 January 1868 age 88 at Hibaldstow.
6. JOSEPH baptized 1 September 1776. Joseph married Jane Button on the 11 June 1805 also at Hibaldstow. He died in 1814.

The following interesting piece was found during a day researching at the archives.

## SECOND GENERATION

Our line now follows down from Robert and Hannah. This was a large family of 12 children. They were all born at Hibaldstow and were:-

1. THOMAS born 1799, Married Elizabeth Grime at Hibaldstow on the 25 December 1829.

Thomas and Elizabeth had five children.

2. JOHN born 1801 and died 1870. Not much is known about John only that in the 1851 census he was still single and living at home with his parents.
3. ELIZABETH born 1803 and Died 19 March 1881. In 1823 Elizabeth had a daughter father unknown. On 5 September 1826 Elizabeth married John Westfield and went on to have a further four children.
4. WILLIAM. Born 1805. A sad story. An inquest in 1807 LQSA/1/347/84&86. Tells us that William died at the age of 2 when his clothes caught fire while his mother was out of the room.
5. ROBERT born 1807 married Caroline Blackburn on the 17 May 1843. Robert and Caroline had 3 children before Robert died on the 18 January 1848 age 41. After Roberts death Caroline did not remarry but went on to have 6 more children all of whom the fathers are unnamed. One of these was a Jacob who in the 1881 census was in Lincoln Prison and was listed as a fisherman. Caroline died 4 January 1895.
6. JAMES born 1810 married Jane Dove at Reepham in 1835. They had one known child.  
By the 1841 census James and Jane had returned to live at Hibaldstow. James died in 1883 and Jane in 1907.
7. JOSEPH. Born 1812. married Eliza Short at Worlaby on the 4 December 1850. They had one known child. Eliza died in 1864 and Joseph in November 1900.
8. HANNAH born 1813 married Enoch Bateman on the 4 June 1835. I have yet to find if they had any family or when Hannah or Enoch died.
9. GEORGE born 1816 died the same year
10. MARY born 1817 I have yet to find out more details of this one.
11. CHARLES born July 13<sup>th</sup> 1820. More later
12. GEORGE born 1822 married Hannah Kennington on the 5 April 1855. Hannah died 5 October 1855. Did Hannah die in childbirth? This is a possibility. But not yet verified.  
On the 12 October 1862 George married Ann Cressey at the Wesleyan Chapel Scawby. They had 8 children.

As far as the children of these families are concerned I do have details of some of them and if anyone would like them please let me know.

### THIRD GENERATION

My reserch next takes us to CHARLES the son of Robert and Hannah. Charles married Mary Bullivant on the 13th May 1844 at the pretty village of Appleby. On

the marriage certificate Mary's surname is spelt Bulleyment and her fathers as Bulleyvent. As I have pointed out before spellings do vary. Mary was born on the 21<sup>st</sup> December 1821 to William Bullivant and Martha nee Lammin/g. For the first few years of their marriage Charles and Mary lived at Castlethorpe between Brigg and Broughton, and it was here that their first son CHARLES was born in July 1845. By 1847 the family had moved to Hibaldstow and it was here that four more children were born. They were:-

2. WILLIAM born 1848 and married Jane Huddlestone about 1871 and lived for some time at Crosby. They had seven known children.

3. MARTHA HANNAH born 1851 married John Drayton on the 25 April 1874 at Redbourne. They had eight children.

4. GEORGE born 1854 married Amey Elizabeth ? between 1871 and 1881 I do not know at present if there were any children from this marriage.

5. ALICE born 1858. At present I have been unable to find any more information about Alice.

#### FOURTH GENERATION

I will fill in this family as much as I can. I do have names of wives and some children but possibly not all.

Charles Standerline married Hannah Corney on the 31 October 1865 at Broughton. For a few years the lived at Castlethorpe and then moved around for several years before eventually settling down at Whitton. Charles died on the 5 December 1918 and is buried at Whitton. Hannah died on the 18 January 1920 and is also buried at Whitton this was were they spent the last 20 odd years of their lives together. There family were:-

1. Hannah born in 1867 at Broughton (Castlethorpe). A sad story Hannah had a son Harry born in March 1887 out of wedlock. Harry was brought up by his grandparents as their son and brother to their children. Unfortunately Harry was killed in WW1 and is buried at Spoil Bank Cemetery Yleper Belgium. Hannah later married Thomas Stanham between July and September 1899. They had four know children. Charles William born 1900, Thomas Corney 1905, Arthur 1907 and Frank Selby 1914. Hannah died at Scotter on the 28 December 1952. She had been with her sister Mary at Nettleton just a month before she died.

2. George was born at Broughton (Castlethorpe) in 1868 He married Hannah or Anna M Booth and they had 3 known children Nellie born 1895, Hannah 1898 and Eva 1900. I think that there was possibly a son born after Eva but this needs confirming. Also I do not know where George and Hannah were married or where or when they died.

3. John born 1870 again at Broughton (Castlethorpe) In August 1893 John married Ellen Kirk at Bottesford. Ellen was the daughter of Sarah Kirk who Married William

Bee. On the marriage certificate for John and Ellen it says her father is unknown. And in the 1881 census she is living with her mother Sarah and stepfather William and their family in Ashby and is named as Ellen Bee. Known children of John and Ellen are Jessie. Fred 1888, Herbert 1893, John William 1896 and Albert 1899. I think that there could possibly be another daughter but not sure. Neither do I know the date of Jessie's birth. John died on the 16 July 1946 and Ellen 14 February 1955.

6. Thomas. Born about July 1871. Since starting this piece of history I have found details of an inquest for a Thomas Standerline age 2years 7months in 1874 at Barton upon Humber. The father of Thomas was Charles Standerline a farm bailiff. Thomas drowned after he fell into a pond. When the family actually moved to Barton upon Humber is unknown. What is certain is that Hannah would at the time of Thomas's death been expecting Mary Alice. It was not unusual in the Victorian period for deaths never to be spoken of after they occurred especially if they were those of children.

5. Mary Alice. Between the birth of John and Mary the family had move to live at Horkstow Road, Barton upon Humber. Mary was born on the 16 August 1874. On the 28 March 1897 Mary married Willie Clark. Their children were Dorothy born 1898, Elsie 1899, Eleaanor 1902, Charles 1909, Rhoda 1912 and Grace 1915. After the births of Dorothy and Elsie at Somerby near Bigby the family moved to Roxby cum Risby where we find them in the 1901 census. They were only there for a short while as by the birth of Eleanor they were back at Grasby, where Charles and Rhoda were also born before the family moved to Stope Hill where Willie went to work for his brother Charles. Stope Hill was also the birth place of the youngest of Mary and Willie's family Grace. Later they moved with Charles to Hemswell and then to Belmont. Upon retirement Mary and Willie moved to Nettleton where they spent the remainder of their years together. Willie died in April 1962 and Mary Alice in March 1969.

6. Ellen. Ellen was born at Barton upon Humber in 1876. She married Amos Platt at Clixby on March 18 1901. I have one known child Charles (Charlie) but there may be other which I need to check for. I have no dates for the deaths of either Ellen or Amos.

7. Dorothy. Again born at Barton upon Humber in 1878. Dorothy I believe was in Service with the Spilmans at Clixby in 1901 the same family with whom her sister Mary was before her marriage. In 1909 Dorothy married Frederick Bell of Whitton and they had the village shop. Dorothy and Fred had five children. John Haywood Bell 1911, Joseph Charles no date, Corney Frederick no date, Hettie 1917 and Alan Antony 1922. Dorothy died about 1922/3.

8. Charles. A proud but sad life. The family had now moved again and Charles was born in 1880 at Sand House Appleby. In October 1900 Charles enlisted for the army, and was stationed at Hulme Barracks Manchester. In January he was on duty at Queen Victoria's Funeral, A dreadful rainy day. Charles subsequently became ill and died of Rheumatic fever on the 28<sup>th</sup> March 1901. He was laid to rest at Salford Road Cemetery on the 1<sup>st</sup> of April 1901 at the age of 21.

9. James. In 1882 James was also born at Appleby. In the 1901 census James is living with his sister Hannah and her husband at Saxby all Saints he is an apprentice blacksmith. Later having his own business at White Cross Street Barton upon Humber.

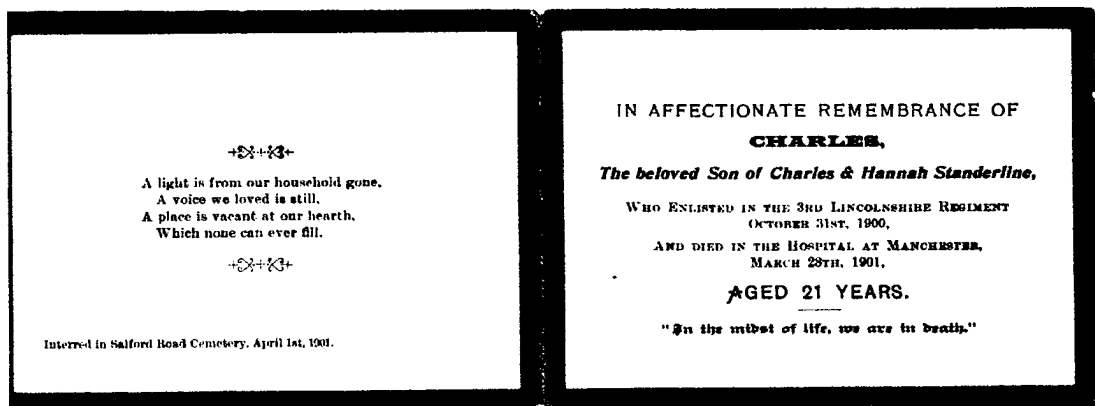
In 1910 he married his first wife Gertrude Clappison . I do not know when Gertrude died but James later married Ellen or Nellie Felgate There was one daughter Phyllis I suspect by James second wife. James died 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1953.

10. Corney. The family on the move again Corney was born in 1884 at Saxby all Saints. In 1901 Corney was a farm worker at Alkborough. By 1907 he had moved and was living in Yorkshire at Stainton a village near Tickhill. It was here that he married Gertrude Mullins on the 28 January 1908. Corney and Gertrude had five children. Fred 1908, Corney 1909, Agnes 1911, Harry 1913, and Dorothy 1915. In WW1 because he worked with horses Corney was sent from the village of Ulley where he was living to go to war to look after the horses. However he apparently suffered from an attack of gas and was sent home only to return after he recovered. Corney died in 1941 after a fall down the stairs verdict accidental death. He is buried at Aston cemetery close by the M1 motorway not far from Sheffield.

11. Martha (Pattie). Like James and Corney Martha was born at Saxby all Saints in 1887. From what I can gather Martha had a tough life. She married Thomas Thornton and lived at Whitton. Martha and Thomas had 11 children. Twins Dorothy and Ellen 1913, Ellen died at a few months of age. Catherine 1923 died 1944, Jim, Charles, Arthur and Harry another set of twins, Tom, Ernest, and Walter. Some of these dates of Birth I do not know.

12. Thomas Edward. Like Martha and Corney, Thomas was born at Saxby all Saints, this was in 1889. By 1901 the family had moved again this time to Whitton where they stayed. I believe that Thomas was in a Yorkshire Regiment in WW1 but have not idea of his service record. Thomas married May Wilkinson at Messingham on the 31 May 1920. They had two known sons Charles Henry 1825 and Gordon 1927. I have no idea when Thomas or May died. There are various snippets of family information in Auntie Elsie's diary but nothing about Uncle Tom and Aunt May. I do know however that they were still alive in 1969 as in the funeral report for Mary Alice it says that they were unable to attend.

The copy of this card was sent to me by a grandson of Martha Thornton's. Just thought it may be of interest.



Since starting this information I have discovered that Isaac the son of William and Jane also had a son Isaac and he married a Irene Clappison a distant relation to Gertrude Clappison wife of James Standerline. The Clappison family are also related to the Middleton's on my dad's side. Some one once said that 'We are all related' and I am beginning to think that this is true. The number of connections with various families on other sides of my research is surprising.

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The eldest son of Thomas Standerline and Elizabeth Grime went to the States in 1854 ten days after his marriage History of this family makes interesting reading.

**This seems to be a cutting from a news paper printed in the U.S.A.** -----

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' ...such has been the career of Mr. Standerline, (George) who after many years of active and honourable connection with agricultural pursuits is now living in Corey. He is a native of Lincolnshire, England, born on the 14<sup>th</sup> October, 1830, and is a son of Thomas Standerline, whose birth occurred in the same locality. He was a farmer by occupation and thus provided for the support of his wife and children. He married Elizabeth Grime, a native of Lincolnshire, who spent her entire life in England. In their family were three daughters, George Standerline being the only son. The days of his childhood and youth were spent in his native land and he is indebted to its public school system for the educational privileges he enjoyed. In his boyhood he became familiar with farm work and later engaged in general agricultural pursuits on his own account.

Mr Standerline was married in his native country in 1854 to Miss Jane Hollandtrick, who was born in Lincolnshire, England, on October 23 1835, a daughter of William and Maria (Peck) Hollandtrick, who were also natives of that country and spent their entire lives in England. Ten days after their marriage, Mr and Mrs Standerline started for America, for they believed that they might enjoy better opportunities in the new world, of which they had heard such favourable reports.. They were seven weeks on boardship, crossing the Atlantic from England to Quebec, Canada, and thence proceeded up the St Lawrence river to the Lakes.

They made their way first to Toledo, Ohio, where they spent one summer, after which they came to Michigan., making their way to White Pigeon, St. Joseph country,

Michigan. They resided in Pigeon prairie for thirteen years, on the expiration of which period Mr Standerline came to Newberg township, Cass county, and purchased a farm on section 25. He was the owner of that property until 1902 when he sold the farm. He had lived, however, in Corey for twenty-two consecutive years, having retired from active business life to enjoy in his comfortable home a well earned rest and the fruits of his former toil.

Unto Mr and Mrs. Standerline have been born seven children, who are yet living, namely: Richard, at home; Thomas, a resident of Newberg township; William and George, who are living in Newberg township, James. of Mishawaka, Indiana; Alice, the wife of Marshall Hughes, a resident of South Bend, Indiana; and Annetta, the wife of Frank Rockwell, of Newberg township.

Mr Standerline is one of the leading and representative citizens of Cass county and has assisted in making it what it is today. He has been a Republican since the organization of the party, never faltering in his support of its principles. He has served as highway commissioner and school director and at this writing is a member of the board of review. He has always been interested in public affairs and has laboured earnestly for the welfare of the county. He belongs to the Grange and he has many warm friends in that organization and throughout the community in which he has so long lived. He displays in his life many sterling traits of character and his good qualities have won him the genuine and unqualified respect of his fellow men.

**And another piece about his son  
William Standerline**

William Standerline, township clerk and a prominent farmer of Newberg township, resides on section 28, where he has a well improved and valuable farm of sixty acres. He is one of Michigan's native sons and the enterprise and progressive spirit which have been the dominant factors in the up building of the west find exemplification in his active business career. He was born in Florence township, St. Joseph county, Michigan, October 24, 1858. His father, George Standerline, was a native of England, in which country he spent the days of his boyhood and youth and was married, the lady of his choice being Miss Jane Hollandtrick, also a native of that country. They bade adieu to friends and native land about 1854 and sailed for America, locating first in Toledo, Ohio, whence they afterward removed to St. Joseph county, Michigan, settling there upon a farm. They remained for about thirteen years in that county, where MR Standerline purchased a tract of land. They are still living in this township and in 1905 they celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary, having travelled life's journey together for a half century, sharing with each other its joys and its adversity and prosperity. As the years went by they became the parents of ten children, of whom seven are now living.

William Standerline is the third child and third son in this family and was nine years of age when brought by his parents to Cass county. He spent his boyhood days in their home was educated in the district schools and through the summer months aided in the work of the fields, giving his father the benefit of his services in the work of the farm until after he had attained his majority, when he started out in life on his own account.

On the 1<sup>st</sup> of April 1882, Mr Standerline was married to Miss Stella Arnold, a daughter of H.D. and Mary (Dunn) Arnold. Mrs Standerline was born in Newberg township, where her parents located at an early period in the development of this county. By her marriage she has become the mother of three children, who are yet living: Della, the wife of Guy Harwood a resident of Newberg township; Bert who is attending school in Vandalia, Michigan; and Glenn, who is at home.

The farm upon which the family resides comprises sixty acres of good land, and here Mr. Standerline is successfully carrying on general agricultural pursuits. He had placed his fields under a high state of cultivation and annually harvests good crops. Everything about his farm is kept in good condition and in his methods he is practical and enterprising. He has been quiet active in local politics, recognised as one of the strong and stalwart advocates of the Republican Party. He was treasurer of Newberg township for two years and has been clerk for six years, holding the position at the present time. Having spent the greater part of his life in this county he is widely known and his prominence in public affairs has made him a leader in his community. His long continuance in office is indicative of his faithful and capable service. In business matters, he is found to be straightforward and reliable, as well as energetic and the success which he has enjoyed is well merited.

#### **SKELTONS IN THE CUPBOARD.**

I have also found a piece taken from the Lindsey quarter sessions that Charles Standerline born 1820 was in 1845 in Lincoln prison connected with a Legal Settlement of a William Dent otherwise Horner. The incident appears to have happened about 11 years prior to Charles having signed this article in Lincoln Castle Prison on the 5 September 1845. It appears that Charles and the said William were working for the same person. Because of copyright I cannot print the entire article but this is the gist of the piece.

#### **\*\*A NEW SUGGESTION FOR THE NAME STANDERLINE\*\***

Since starting this article I have been contacted by a member of the Standerline family (born 1918) and he suggests there may be another meaning for this name. As a worker for British Petroleum he travelled around Europe and found the name SANDERLIN was fairly common in Sweden and in Germany, particularly Hanover, another common name was ZANDERLING. He says that when being Anglicised it is usual to change the 'Z' to 'ST' thus becoming STANDERLING. Could it be that when the Hanoverian period of the English Monarchs began in 1715 that some of the ZANDERLING families probably came over to England and this is how the name originated. Perhaps we shall never know, but at least it is one possible explanation to the question of how the name arose.

I do hope that some of you at least have enjoyed going back with me in my research for our 'ROOTS' as you can imagine it is not an easy task but one which however much I find out there are always more questions to be asked.
